

Lexington- Fayette Urban County Government Council Meeting

Lexington, Kentucky May 5, 2022

The Council of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, Kentucky convened in regular session on May 5, 2022 at 6:02 p.m. Present were Vice-Mayor Kay in the chair presiding, in the absence of Mayor Gorton, and the following members of the Council: Kloiber, Lamb, LeGris, McCurn, Moloney, Plomin, Reynolds, Sheehan, Worley, Baxter, Bledsoe, F. Brown, J. Brown, and Ellinger.

The reading of the Minutes of the previous meeting was waived.

Ordinances No. 31-2022 through 33-2022, inclusive, and Resolutions No. 169-2022 through 202-2022, inclusive, were reported as having been signed and published and ordered to record.

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The Invocation was given by Senior Pastor Keith Tyler of Antioch Missionary Baptist Church.

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Upon motion by Ms. Bledsoe, seconded by Ms. Baxter, and approved by unanimous vote, the Minutes of the April 28, 2022 Council Meeting were approved.

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Vice Mayor Kay asked Dale Henley, President of the Lafayette Chapter of the Sons of American Revolution, to join him at the podium, and read a Proclamation, on behalf of Mayor Gorton, declaring May 16, 2022 as General Marquis de Lafayette Day in Lexington.

Mr. Henley spoke about the Gen. de Lafayette, and the Sons of the American Revolution. He thanked the Vice Mayor and Council for the opportunity and recognition on behalf of the Chapter.

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Vice Mayor Kay asked Marcey Ansley, Executive Dir. of the Hearing and Speech Center of Lexington, to join her at the podium, and read a Proclamation, on behalf of Mayor Gorton, declaring May 2022 as Better Hearing and Speech Month in Lexington.

Ms. Ansley thanked the Council for the recognition.

Rev. Michael Wilson, Wilson St., spoke about affordable housing and homelessness.
