Summary and Motions

Chair Worley called the meeting to order at 1:01 p.m. Vice Mayor Wu and Committee Members J. Brown, Ellinger, Lynch, LeGris, Sheehan, Baxter, Reynolds, Plomin were in attendance. Council Member Sevigny was also present as a non-voting member.

I. February 14, 2023 GGP Committee Summary

Motion by J. Brown to approve the February 14, 2023 GGP Committee Summary. Seconded by Plomin. Motion passed without dissent.

II. Language Access Website Review

Nick Brock presented on behalf of this item. He provided background information on why the website translation feature was developed. The feature was quietly launched in December of 2022. There are 81 languages and it is accessible from any page on LFUCG's website. It does not translate .pdfs but they are working with departments to reduce the number of .pdfs on the website. Brock gave a demonstration on how to use the feature. Moving forward, they are adding analytics and more languages. Council members expressed support and provided a few small pieces of feedback.

III. Vacation Leave Policy Update

Eric Howard, Deputy Director of Human Resources, gave a presentation on the proposed Vacation Leave Policy. He shared the four major leave categories: Sick, holiday, compensatory time, and vacation leave. Currently, full-time classified civil service employees earn 10 hours of vacation leave per month for ten years and then it moves to 14 years. They can carry over 168 hours of vacation. During the pandemic, Council approved ordinances that provided employees the opportunity to carry over all accrued vacation hours. The proposal is to increase vacation leave carryover from 168 hours to 336 hours and cap vacation leave payouts upon separation at 336 hours. This proposal allows any employee who separates prior to December 31, 2023 to receive payment for all accumulated vacation leave per the Code of Ordinances. All employees will be cut back to 336 hours on December 31, 2023.

CAO Hamilton said this policy was preempted by the potential cost of payouts at the end of the year, especially because many employees with high levels of vacation can leave and/or retire.

Motion by Sheehan to approve the Vacation Leave Policy proposal. Seconded by Baxter. Motion passed without dissent.

Motion by Baxter to do a partial report-out on this item at the March 7, 2023 Work Session. Seconded by Sheehan. Motion passed without dissent.

IV. Short-Term Rentals

J. Brown introduced the item. He explained that the Ordinance to Council will go to the Planning Commission and the Ordinance will be tabled until the Planning Commission sends the resolution back. A presentation on the updated Short-Term Rental policies was made by Council Research Analyst Kendra Thompson. Thompson gave a brief overview of the history of the item. The purpose of the regulation change is to establish short-term rentals as a legal use and to define a process for approval and enforcement. Amendments to the Code of Ordinances include: definitions, process of obtaining a special fee license, special fee license enforcement, transient room taxes and occupational license fees, create of short-term rental “duties of licensee,” and establishment of licensee requirements for online advertising. Both the Ordinance and ZOTA was changed based on community feedback received in the fall of 2022. Thompson included the ways in which the feedback was incorporated.

The next steps of this item is for Council to initiate a ZOTA and then refer it to the Planning Commission. Once the Planning Commission approves the ZOTA, it will return to Council. Council members asked questions regarding the complaint process, private events, and Conditional Use inspections. The fees collected will go back into the enforcement effort.

Motion by J. Brown to approve the Short Term Rental ZOTA. Seconded by Councilmember Sheehan. Motion passed without dissent.

Motion by J. Brown to report-out the Short Term Rental ZOTA at the March 7, 2023 work session. Seconded by Sheehan. Motion passed without dissent.

Motion by J. Brown to approve the Short Term Rental ordinance and report-out at today's work session (March 7, 2023). Seconded by Sheehan. Motion passed without dissent.

Motion by Reynolds to remove Language Access. Seconded by Sheehan. Motion passed without dissent.

What are conditional uses?

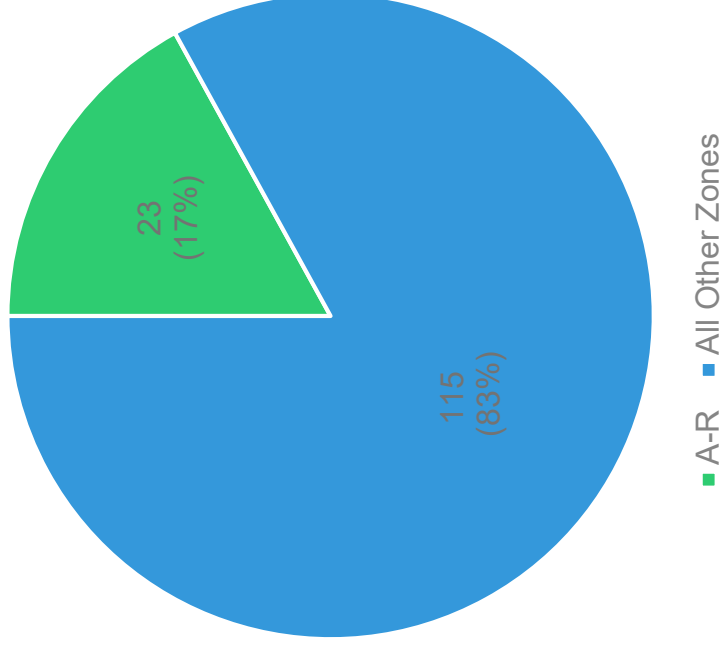
Uses, which are specifically named in the Zoning Ordinance, which may be suitable only in specific locations in the zone only if certain conditions are met and which would not have an adverse influence on existing or future development of the subject property or its surrounding neighborhood.

- Must be approved by the Board of Adjustment (or the Planning Commission if requested during a zone change) at a public hearing
- Requires notice to nearby property owners
- Subject to annual inspection by Zoning Enforcement

There are 33 conditional uses listed in the A-R zone.

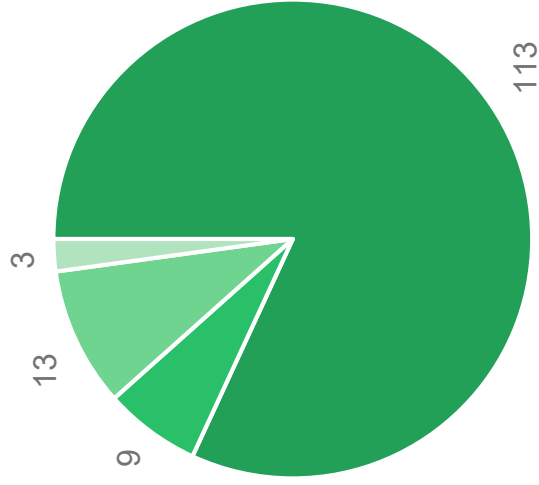

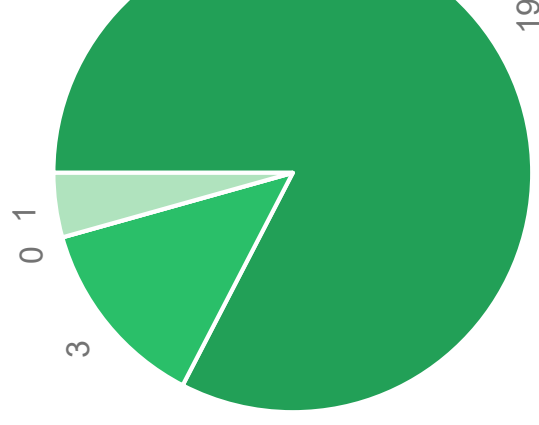

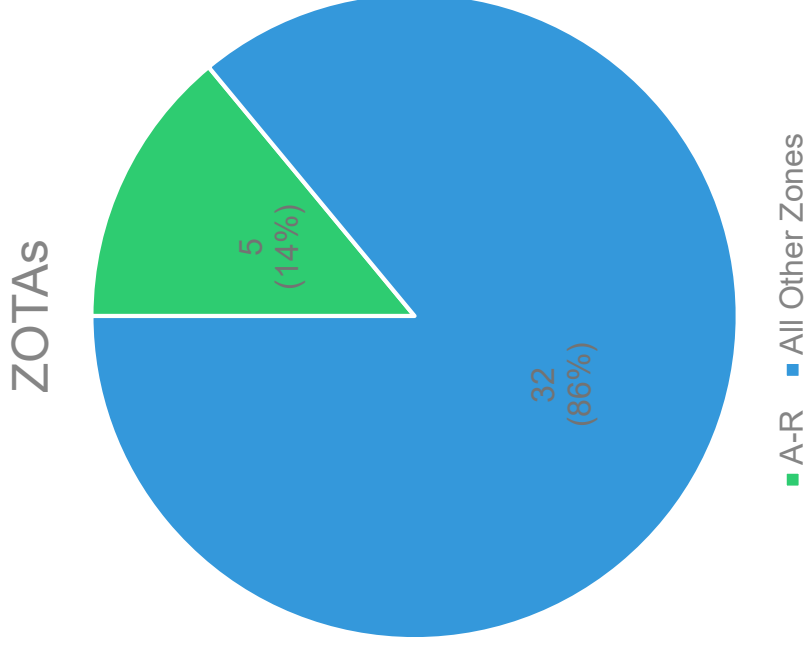
What is a Zoning Ordinance Text Amendment?

ZOTAs are typically broad policy changes within the Zoning Ordinance and are not tied to a specific property. These proposed changes are based on the needs of the community as a whole.

A proposal for a ZOTA may originate with any person or governmental body.

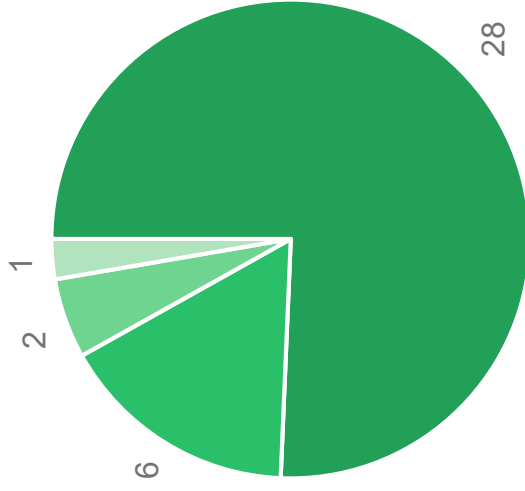

ZOTA Applications (2018-2023)

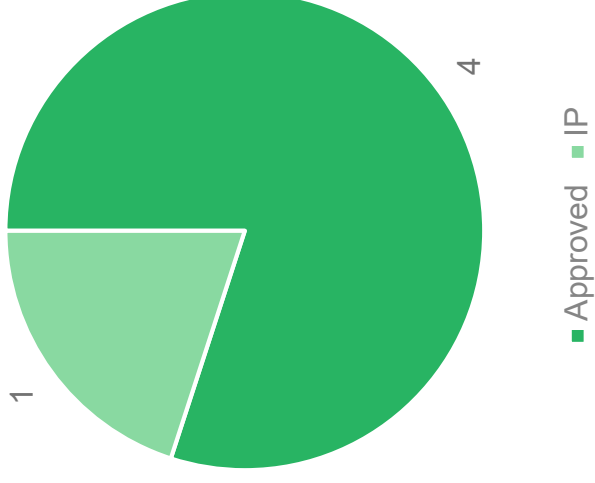


ZOTA Approval Rate (2018-2023)

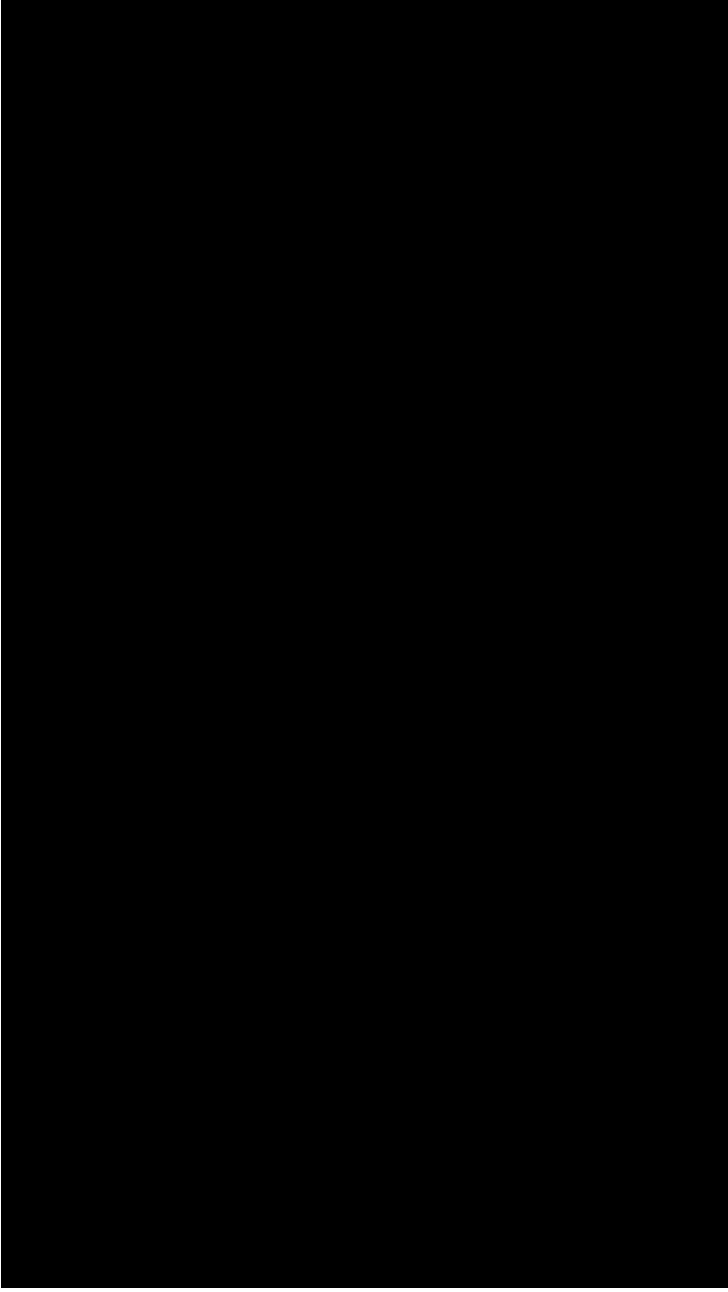

Create a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair



What: The C.R.O.W.N. Act

- Legislation that protects against discrimination based on natural hair texture and protective styles.
- To date, the C.R.O.W.N. Act—or legislation inspired by it—has been signed into law in **21 states**.
- First introduced in California in 2019, most recently passed in Massachusetts
- **44 municipalities** have passed legislation against hair discrimination

Why: The C.R.O.W.N. Act

- In 2014, the United States Army explicitly banned locs, calling them “unkempt or matted.”
- In 2018, a six-year-old child was allegedly forced to give up a scholarship at a private school because the school would not permit him to wear locs. The style was explicitly prohibited in the student handbook along with “mohawks, designs, unnatural color, or unnatural designs.”

Why: The C.R.O.W.N. Act

- C.R.O.W.N. Research Study conducted by JOY Collective for Dove & The CROWN Coalition, 2019
 - US based study among 2000 Women, aged 25-64 - 1000 Black and 1000 White
 - Employed full-time, working in an office of field (sales) setting OR having worked in a corporate office in the previous six months.

According to the study:

- Black women's hair is **3.4 times** more likely to be perceived as unprofessional.
- Black women are **80% more likely** to agree with the statement, **"I have to change my hair from its natural state to fit in at the office."**
- Black women are **30% more likely** to be made aware of a formal workplace appearance policy.
- Black women are **1.5 times more likely** to be sent home from work because of their hair, and **83% more likely** to report being judged more harshly on their looks than other women.

Why: The C.R.O.W.N. Act?

- Rating of hairstyles on Black women were rated *consistently lower* or “*less ready*” for job performance.

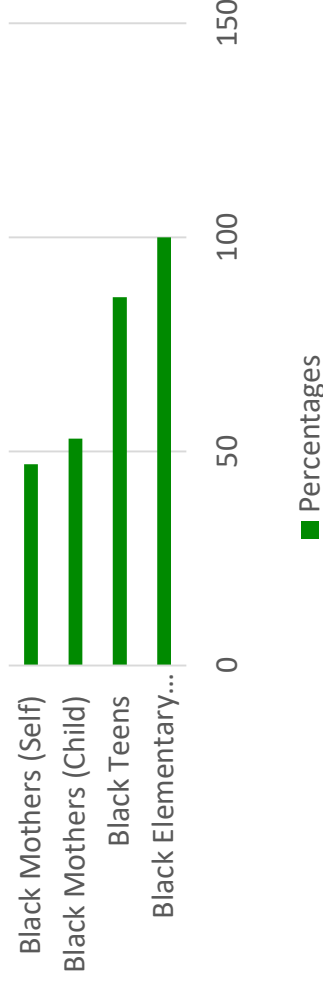

C.R.O.W.N. Research Study conducted by JOY Collective for Dove & The CROWN Coalition, 2021

- *US based study among 1000 School-Aged Girls, aged 5-18*
- *500 Black and 500 White*
- *Mix of Black girls who attend predominately Black schools, diverse schools, and predominately White schools*

Why: The C.R.O.W.N. Act

- 47% of Black mothers reported having experienced hair discrimination
- 53% of Black mothers say their daughters have experienced racial discrimination based on hairstyles – as early as *five years old*
 - ***increases to 100% by the age of ten*** (in predominately-White schools)
- 66% of Black children in majority-White schools have faced race-based hair discrimination
- 81% of Black children in majority-White schools say they sometimes wish their hair was straight

ORDINANCE NO. _____ - 2023

AN ORDINANCE, KNOWN AS THE C.R.O.W.N. ACT, CREATING SECTION 2-31.1 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO DECLARE NATURAL HAIR TEXTURE, STYLE, AND PROTECTIVE COVERINGS AS A PROTECTED CHARACTERISTIC OF RACE AND NATIONAL ORIGIN IN ORDER TO PROHIBIT DISCRIMINATION BASED ON THESE CHARACTERISTICS.

WHEREAS, the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government Code of Ordinances Chapter 2, Article II adopts the provisions of state law protecting all individuals in Lexington-Fayette County from discrimination in employment, public accommodations, and housing on the basis of race and national origin; and

WHEREAS, bans or restrictions on natural hair or hairstyles exacerbate anti-Black bias in employment, at school, while playing sports, and in other areas of daily living; and

WHEREAS, research has found that 70 percent of all suspension disciplines are discretionary. Specifically, Black students are more likely to be suspended for discretionary reasons such as dress code or long hair violations, neither of which have been found to be predictive of student misconduct. (Brookings Institute, "Penalizing Black hair in the name of academic success is undeniably racist, unfounded, and against the law," Feb. 23, 2011); and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair coalition (C.R.O.W.N.) is to prohibit race-based hair discrimination through the adoption of legislation commonly known as C.R.O.W.N. acts, which institute definitions of race and national origin inclusive of a person's hair texture, style, color, and head coverings; and

WHEREAS, the Urban County Council desires to recognize that a person's hair texture, style, color and head coverings are protected characteristics of race and national origin, subject to the protections of state and local laws prohibiting discrimination based on race and national origin.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT:

Section 1 – That a new section of the Code of Ordinances of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government be and hereby is created, to read as follows:

Sec. 2-31.1 – Natural texture and color of hair and protective hair styles as protected characteristics of race, national origin and religion.

(1) It is the policy of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government to safeguard all persons within Fayette County from discrimination in employment, public accommodation, and housing on the basis of race, national origin, and religion.

(2) For purposes of this section, “race” shall include traits historically associated with race, including but not limited to natural texture and color of hair; hair styles; whether or not hair is adorned by hair ornaments such as ribbon, headwraps, beads or barrettes; and protective hair styles.

(a) Natural hair includes, but is not limited to, hair that is treated or untreated, protective styles, and hair types and styles that are commonly associated with African-Americans and their racial, ethnic, cultural identities and expressions, and the unwanted touching thereof;

(b) Protective hair styles include, but are not limited to braids, locs, twists, cornrows, Bantu Knots, afros, whether or not hair extensions or treatments are used to create or maintain any such style, whether or not hair is adorned by hair ornaments, beads, headwraps or hair covering, necessary protective hair styles needed due to medical conditions, and the unwanted touching thereof;

(3) For purposes of this section, “national origin” includes natural texture and color of hair, hair styles, and protective hair styles, including but not limited to braids, locs, twists, cornrows, Bantu Knots, afros, whether or not hair extensions or treatments are used to create or maintain any such style, and whether or not hair is adorned by hair ornaments, beads, headwraps, or hair coverings, related to a person’s place of birth or ancestry.

(4) For purposes of this section, “religion” includes hair styles that are an expression of religious observance and practice, as well as belief, unless an employer demonstrates that they are unable to reasonably accommodate to an employee’s or prospective employee’s religious observance or practice without undue hardship on the conduct of the employer’s business;

(5) The Lexington Fayette Urban County Human Rights Commission shall have jurisdiction to receive, investigate, conciliate, hold hearings, and issue orders relating to complaints filed alleging discrimination in employment, public accommodation, or housing based on the race or national origin, specifically as it pertains to the natural hair or protective hairstyle of the complaining party.

Section 2 – That this Ordinance shall be known as the “C.R.O.W.N. Act.”

Section 3 – That this Ordinance shall become effective on the date of its passage.
